Update from the President by Mark Spicka

I hope everyone is staying healthy and safe. In November I was honored to be elected President of BSWA after serving as Treasurer for over fifteen years. The Board and I would like to thank Tom Smithwick for his extraordinary leadership as President of BSWA. We deeply appreciate all that he has done to protect, restore, and preserve the Big Spring.

Despite the pandemic, we have stayed busy. During the spring and summer of 2020, Mary Blakeslee and her crew maintained and expanded the native plantings garden at the corner of Nealy and Big Spring Rds. BSWA was recently awarded a \$4550 Land Partnership Grant from Cumberland County to continue work on the garden and provide educational signage. BSWA also partnered with the Central PA Conservancy to eradicate invasive plants, including purple loosestrife, along the spring. In October 2020, we conducted a socially-distanced cleanup, picking up trash and debris that accumulated along Big Spring Rd. An area of concern that has developed is the apparent loss of flow that Big Spring is experiencing between Nealy Rd. and the stone arch bridge. We are in contact with the PAFBC to continue to monitor the situation. If you have not done already, I ask you to renew your membership to BSWA. As the pandemic subsides, we hope to continue our work. I hope to see you on the spring as the weather improves!

Anglers from around the world visit Big Spring to fish for large brook trout. The first reach of Big Spring holds 250 kilograms of brook trout per hectare; the second reach holds 150 kilograms per hectare. No stream in North America holds more brook trout per surface hectare.

Mission Statement

The Big Spring Watershed Association (BSWA) is organized for charitable, scientific, and educational purposes, more specifically to protect and enhance the quality of the Big Spring Watershed.

The Big Spring Watershed Association was formed in 2001 with the goals of protecting and managing wild native trout populations of the Big Spring, and other natural, cultural, and historical resources of the watershed. We hope to aid in restoring the stream and reestablishing a wild, natural reproducing brook trout population in its waters, as well as protecting the stream for residents, visitors, and future generations.

The Big Spring Creek is the 5th largest spring in Pennsylvania. It is one of the world's most productive limestone spring creeks. In the past, the Big Spring was considered by anglers to have been the premier limestone brook trout stream in the Eastern United States.

Our organization is made up of concerned citizens, scientists, fishermen, birders, and others who recognize the Big Spring's value and wish to restore and preserve it.



Watershed Restoration Project

Phase 1 was completed October, 2010.

Phase 2 was completed August, 2013.

This is part of an ongoing effort to improve habitat for all wildlife along the stream.
